



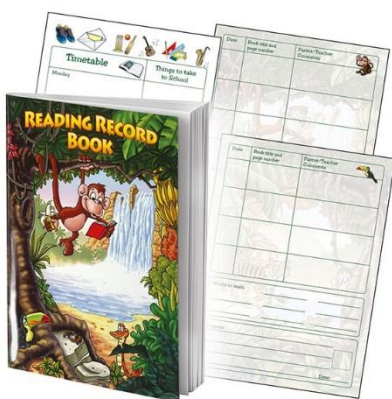
Learning to read: supporting your child at home

At school we are using the *Phonics International* scheme to continue your child's journey of learning to read. Phonics International is a step-by-step phonics reading scheme. It introduces the children to the letters and sounds (the alphabetic code) that are at the foundation of all reading and writing.



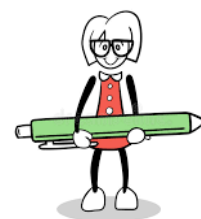
To reinforce the teaching in school, your child will bring home some books to share with you. These will include:

- *An Accelerated Reader book that has been levelled to match your child's ability. They should be able to read this book independently.*
- *A story book to enjoy together. Your child may not be able to read all of the words in this book yet, and may need support to read and enjoy it.*



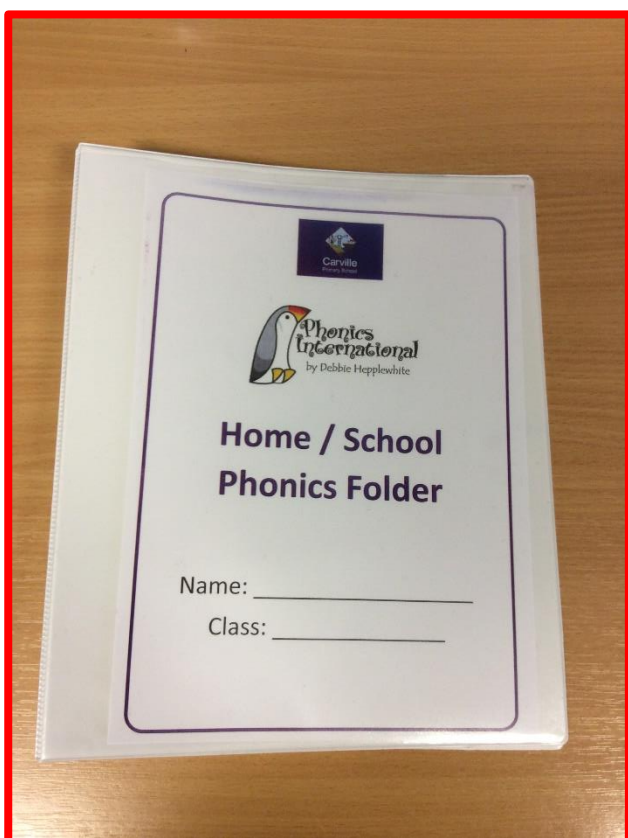
Reading at home can be recorded in their Reading Record.

Just write the book you have read and a simple comment.



Children will be given new reading books each Monday.
These will be collected in each Friday.

As well as reading books, your child will bring home each day their Phonics International Folder. This will contain all of their in-school phonics learning, which can be used to share their progress and support reading at home.



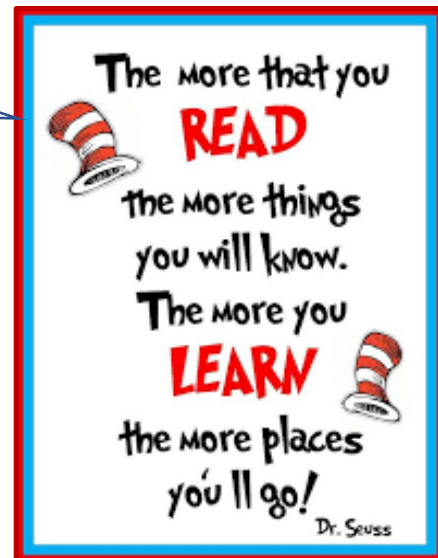
If your child is struggling with a particular sound, ask them to look it up in their phonics folder to refresh their memory. They may only need a simple reminder using the Alphabetic Code found at the beginning, or may need further support by revisiting the worksheet relating to that sound.

How often should my child be reading at home?

What should be in my child's reading satchel?

Home/School Phonics Folder containing:

- Alphabetic Code
- Alphabet
- Worksheets completed at school

Reading for Pleasure Book

Read and enjoy this book with your child – this could be simply talking about the book, or it could be read to your child as a bedtime story.



Reading Record

Make a simple note of the book you share with your child, with a date and signature.

Comments on your child's reading can be included if you wish.

Accelerated Reader Book

This book will be levelled for your child to be able to read independently. These books will have a coloured sticker and an Accelerated Reader information label on them.

In order to give your child the best chance of success, it is essential that these items are brought to school each day and are well looked after.

If any of these books, files or the satchel are lost or damaged then you will be asked to pay for a replacement. Please support your child to look after them and it will never cost you a penny!

TOP TIP: Have a safe place at home where the reading satchel can be stored when not being used.
